

# **State Policy Fact Sheet: Delaware**

## **Nurse Practice Act:**

24 Del.C. § 1901 and 1934

### **Regulatory Structure: Full Practice**

Delaware practice and licensure laws authorize nurse practitioners (NPs) to evaluate patients, diagnose and prescribe medications and therapeutic measures.

#### Regulatory Agency

NP licensure is regulated exclusively by the Board of Nursing (BON).

#### Licensure Requirements

Requirements include a registered nurse (RN) license, a graduate degree in an NP role and national certification.

#### Continuing Education (CE)\*

National advanced practice registered nurse certification requirements satisfy statute, in addition to specific RN requirements. Exemptions may apply. See BON for details.

#### Medical Staff Membership\*\*

Medical staff composition is determined by a facility's bylaws.

#### **Primary Care Providers**

NPs are defined as primary care providers.

#### Signature Recognition on Items of Patient Care

- Physical Therapy: NPs are authorized to refer to physical therapy.

- Parking Permits: NPs are authorized to provide proof of disability for parking permits.

- Death Certificates: NPs are authorized to sign death certificates in accordance with the Nurse Practice Act. 24 Del.C. § 1935
- Delaware Provider Orders for Life Sustaining Treatment (POLST)/Medical Orders for Scope of Treatment (MOST): NPs are authorized to sign the MOST form.
